Fellows & Minchin Freight Depot



The reason behind this is I am the 'Fellows' part of Fellows Morton & Clayton, the famous Canal carriers of the early 20th Century.



One of their canal narrow boats is preserved and can be seen at the Black Country Museum.

The firm first started by James Fellows, it eventually expanded and merged with Frederick Morton & Thomas Clayton. They transported goods, mainly coal, all over the country by canal.

Book Review:

British 1:148 N Gauge Modelling, By Grahame Hedges

When I borrowed this book from a Club Library I was told that I was the first person to borrow it so I thought I would write a quick review – not that book reviews are my strength.

I'm not a new N Gauge Modeller but a returnee after at least 15 years, so I borrowed this book as a part of my education about recent developments and found it very useful.

Grahame starts off by pointing out that the book is not a general "new modeller's introduction" but covers specifics on British N Gauge only. For that reason there are no sections on things like general baseboard construction, wiring and scenery basics but, he concentrates on specifics of N Gauge modelling. If you are a *new* modeller then this book should be read *after* a book covering the basics of modelling.

There are 11 chapters and 10 appendices. The chapters cover such topics as the history of British N Gauge up to about 2013 (fairly up to date), care of motive power, buildings, detailing etc. These chapters contain lots of useful general information but, all are backed up by "Shows you How" type sections, on coloured background, explaining specifics like wagon weathering, constructing simple building kits etc. The book contains lots of good quality photographs illustrating both general modelling and some of the specifics in the special sections. Examples of layouts are generally the author's own layouts but there are photos of modern classic N Gauge layouts too.

My conclusion – a good book for someone who knows the basics or a recent new modeller who wants to develop their skills further. It doesn't go into detailed specifics of things that are common to other scales and gauges like 'electrics'. It is well written and the text is easily understandable.
