#### From our Chairman




#### Layouts

*Gibben Quarry* - Dave has replaced the broken point, and the new one has been tested and re-ballasted.


Tipton Hills - still in its box since being exhibited last autumn.



### **SKETCHFORD** somewhere on there W.C.M.L By Nigel Harrold

Sketchford is, or will be, a modern era dcc layout located somewhere on the electrified 'West Coast Main Line' and hopefully having its first public showing at T.I.N.G.S in September 2019 (fingers crossed). I have been working on building a portable layout and perhaps one I could take to shows, for some two years now. I had previously attempted to build layouts in OO and in N gauge but, these where a permanent fixture in the spare room, and I had to pull them apart, destroying them, when moving house. So I decided that my next N gauge layout should be portable, so that if we had to move again, there would be no problem moving the layout as well.

Not having built a layout like this before, I thought it best to join a model railway club. I could find two or three clubs within a small radius of where I lived, but they all meet on a week night, which is no good for someone like me who works nights. So that's when I came across the 'West Midlands N Gauge Club' who meet on a Saturday, so with that I became a member in February 2017. In my time at the club I have had some very good advice from members, which in turn has saved me from going about the building of the layout in the wrong way i.e. how to join the boards and how to make it easy to transport them.

I was originally going to base the layout on Water Orton, but finding out that the club had Warts and Hall (becoming Whartson Hall), based on Water Orton, in the pipeline, I looked at where to base my layout on and then decided on Stetchford.

A name for the layout - well, being roughly (a *sketch*) based on Stetchford, I decided to name the layout **Sketchford**.

Originally Sketchford was going to be like Stetchford station and junction, with the main line and junction at the north end of the three platform station. But with the layout being financed by my overtime and overtime being cut due to what's happening with Brexit, I had to look at saving money by removing the junction and branchline. Sketchford is now a station in a urban area with terraced housing, small industrial estate to the south, and river to the north.

Sketchford will have a regular stopping service with 'London Midland' 350 Desrio's and the odd 'Crosscountry' Voyager service.

With an update in the next issue of the newsletter (we look forward to that Ed) I should have finished the three scenic boards and am looking at building the control panel for the fiddle yard.

#### From Jeremy, Episode 1 - December 2018

In the December 2018 issue of this Newsletter, Vince kindly printed a short piece with a couple of photos of my new layout 'Charlotte Street'. This was mainly lifted, with my permission, from some of my posts on various Facebook N Gauge groups. At the time that the *Newsletter* was published, I had just laid the trackwork on the main board. At the time of starting to write this episode, I have just connected the trackwork in a 'jury rig' fashion and tested my wiring skills with the cheap Hornby controller that I used on my test track and Elizabeth Wharf, as the Gaugemaster controller was still en-route.

This is the state of the layout showing the basic track plan.

I think the 'backstory' might be important here along with the design considerations. The situation is purely fictional and based around the arrangements in Bristol with a little 'historical licence'. The main station in the town was built by the Great Western Railway Company (as per Bristol Temple Meads) and some time after that the Midland Railway built a line from Gloucester which



ran into Temple Meads. When the lines got busier, the Midland Railway built Bristol St Philips which was a simple terminus to take mainly trains from Bath to relieve the pressure on Temple Meads, although re-modelling there meant that St Philips became superfluous. German bombing in WW2 caused other local problems and the main retail area moved away from the St Philips area. Passenger services closed in the early '50s and goods services continued until the mid '60s. *Charlotte Street* has a similar 'fictional' history, although passenger services remain, with some services linking to the main Western Region station and some semi-fast traffic. The line into Charlotte Street was originally double track but was later reduced to single track.

Design considerations are a little novel. Ken Jones builds layouts on all sorts of different items including suitcases, trays and video cases. You will realise that I use box files exclusively as my baseboards (up until now). This layout follows the same principle but has a separate cassette system for storage, giving lots of opportunity for operation. It is also built with the option of adding it to a permanent layout at home as a removable section. I've also taken a lot of inspiration from my friend Ed Purcell (Todmorden Midland and Gravelly Oak) although the box file format produces a slightly narrower layout with reduced scenic and siding space.

The layout is standard analogue DC for several reasons. Firstly a lot of my stock is fairly old and in the case of Midland Region locos, second hand. This would make chip fitting tricky. Secondly I understand DC electrics having helped my Dad build a layout when I was a kid and having built (or partially built) several myself. There are 3 switched sections: the main line into the station platform and bay, the end of the main platform road, the run around loop and goods sidings. There is also an isolated section at the end of the bay platform line.

A small control box with section switches (and probably signal controls) will plug into the side of the layout. A Gaugemaster controller with 'wallwart' transformer will plug into the box. This should permit front operation at home, rear operation at any show and easy fitment to a main control panel on a permanent layout. Point control will be digital (as per Waterstock and Whartson Hall) i.e. first or second finger of whichever hand is free!

Operation will be as follows. Local traffic will be suburban stock with appropriate tank locos (4MT 2-6-4T etc) using the main platform and locos will run around. Shuttles from the Western Region station will be either Autotrain or 122 Diesel using the bay platform. Semi fast trains will be Stanier coaching stock (3 – 4 coaches) with a suitable loco (Black 5 etc) where the loco will be released and will run off scene for turning (small cassette). Assorted wagons will be used for goods and will be distributed either to a small goods platform or to a spur siding.

This freelance N gauge layout measuring less than 2ft by 18 inch and was built in 1999 by me to act as a test bed for some of my rolling stock, but went on to become a layout in its own right. It could be anywhere in rural England, Scotland or Wales and various locomotives negotiate this tight

single track line passing under the waterfall which was the place that the main line, now a mere siding, joined this delightful scene.


The waterfall and river are made from a 2 pack Faller system, the track is Peco and the controller is a special one built by Len Bane from The West Midlands' N' Gauge Club to enable slow running.

Tender locomotives and those with a long wheelbase cannot negotiate the tight curves. Look out for campers, a trainspotter, and a man with his dog and another one cycling home from work. The land rover is painted in authentic Land Rover green paint supplied by a customer of Ken a long time ago.

I have built several small layouts. This one was my first and is celebrating its 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary this year.

*Waterfall Junction* has been out to at least one exhibition most years since it was built. It has been seen in Kent, West Yorkshire, Greater Manchester, The East and West Midlands as well as exhibitions at the Severn Valley Railway and Nene Valley Railway to name just a few of the places it has been seen. It has appeared on a specialist USA website for small railway layouts, and has had articles published in Norwegian and German model railway magazines - the editors' arranging for the articles to be translated from English. It has also appeared in an Australian N scale newsletter and has been exhibited at TINGS, where it is hoped it will return for its 20th birthday later this year.

For those interested, the suitcase is from an early 1960's design and is one of a set of Python, expanding suitcases, this one was bought new in 1972 and used by a friend of mine travelling around the world, in the oil industry, before becoming the layout. It remains my most requested layout for attending exhibitions, always gets lots of interest from visitors and will remain available for such events despite its age.
